# **Quick Reference Summary**

## Universal BLM Rules (All States):

- Maximum 14 consecutive days per area
- Must move minimum distance after 14 days
- Cannot return to same area for 28 days
- Self-contained camping only
- Leave No Trace principles mandatory

# STATE-BY-STATE COMPLIANCE REQUIREMENTS

#### **ARIZONA**

Relocation Distance: 25 miles minimum (increased from 5 miles in 2025)

Measurement: Straight-line distance

Peak Enforcement: December - March

Violation Rate: 8.4 per 1,000 camper days (highest nationally)

#### **Required Equipment:**

- Portable toilet in designated LTVA areas
- Grey water tank (under 40 gallons)
- Fire extinguisher (2A10BC minimum)
- Shovel for fire suppression

#### LTVA Areas & Fees:

- Quartzsite LTVA: \$420 (7-month), \$40 (weekly)
- Yuma East/West: \$420 (7-month), \$40 (weekly)
- Effective: October 1, 2025

High-Risk Areas: Quartzsite, Yuma, Lake Havasu City

**Common Violations:** Extended stays (34% of citations)

#### **CALIFORNIA**

Relocation Distance: 10 miles (desert regions), 25 miles (elsewhere)

Measurement: Straight-line distance

Peak Enforcement: Year-round with seasonal fire restrictions

Violation Rate: 6.7 per 1,000 camper days

#### **Required Equipment:**

• Portable toilet in designated areas

- Grey water containment system
- Fire extinguisher (2A10BC minimum)
- Shovel for fire suppression

#### **Special Restrictions:**

Fire restrictions: May 1 - October 15

Drone surveillance pilots in desert regions

Environmental damage penalties: \$500-2,000+

High-Risk Areas: Mojave Desert, Imperial County

Common Violations: Environmental damage, off-route travel

# **UTAH**

Relocation Distance: 25 miles minimum

Measurement: Straight-line distance

**Peak Enforcement:** March, September, October (seasonal sweeps)

Violation Rate: 5.9 per 1,000 camper days

# **Required Equipment:**

- Portable toilet (Moab region mandate effective Jan 2025)
- Fire extinguisher (mandatory statewide)
- Shovel for fire suppression
- Waste containers (20+ gallon capacity)

# **Special Restrictions:**

- Sheriff department collaboration for enforcement
- Wildlife protection zones: Zero tolerance
- Higher elevation seasonal closures

High-Risk Areas: Moab corridor, Sand Flats Recreation Area

Common Violations: Permit violations, wildlife disturbance

#### **NEVADA**

Relocation Distance: 25 miles statewide standard

Measurement: Straight-line distance

Peak Enforcement: Minimal in rural areas, increased near cities

Violation Rate: 4.2 per 1,000 camper days

#### **Required Equipment:**

■ Portable toilet at 12+ designated areas

- Waste containers (20+ gallon capacity)
- Fire extinguisher
- Shovel for fire suppression

## **Special Restrictions:**

- Mining area restrictions strictly enforced
- 89% of citations within 50 miles of cities
- GPS tracking used for monitoring

High-Risk Areas: Las Vegas vicinity, Reno area

Common Violations: Mining area trespass, extended stays

#### **COLORADO**

Relocation Distance: 25 miles minimum

Measurement: Straight-line distance

Peak Enforcement: May - October (seasonal access)

Violation Rate: 3.8 per 1,000 camper days

#### **Required Equipment:**

- Fire extinguisher (mandatory above 8,000 feet)
- Shovel for fire suppression
- Bear-proof food storage (wilderness areas)
- Waste containers (20+ gallon capacity)

#### **Special Restrictions:**

- Higher elevation seasonal closures (October May)
- Wildlife protection zones with zero tolerance
- 67% warning rate before citations

High-Risk Areas: Front Range proximity, wilderness boundaries

Common Violations: Seasonal camping, wildlife food storage

#### **NEW MEXICO**

Relocation Distance: 25 miles minimum

Measurement: Straight-line distance

Peak Enforcement: Variable by region

Violation Rate: 3.2 per 1,000 camper days

# **Required Equipment:**

- Fire extinguisher
- Shovel for fire suppression
- Waste containers (20+ gallon capacity)

#### **Special Restrictions:**

- Archaeological site protections strictly enforced
- Fire restrictions during dry seasons
- Cultural resource damage: Federal felony charges possible

# UNIVERSAL PENALTY SCHEDULE

# **Most Expensive Violations (2024 Data)**

- Base fine: \$1,000
- Suppression costs: \$15,000-150,000+
- Prevention: Carry 5+ gallons water, metal fire ring
- 1 Wildfire Caused by Campfire: \$47,850 average
- Basic citation: \$150-300
- Habitat restoration: \$500-2,000
- Recovery/towing: \$200-800

#### 1 Off-Route Driving with Resource Damage: \$650 average

- Grey water: \$200-300
- Black water: \$500-750
- Environmental restoration: \$2,000-5,000 additional

#### 1 Waste Dumping Violations: \$425 average

- During burn bans: \$300-500
- Unattended fire: \$200-400 additional
- Equipment confiscation possible

#### 1 Fire Restriction Violations: \$385 average

- Tree/shrub damage: \$200-500
- Restoration costs: Variable, often \$1,000+
- Rare plant damage: Federal felony possible

#### 1 Vegetation Damage: \$320 average

- First offense: \$75-150
- Repeat violations: \$500-1,000
- Equipment seizure: Possible after 3rd violation

#### 1 Extended Stay (Over 14 Days): \$275 average

- No permit: \$100-200
- Ejection: Immediate + lost site fees

- Expired permit: \$75-125
- 1 LTVA Permit Violations: \$150 average
- Over 14 people: \$75-150
- Group camping: Requires special permits
- Multiple vehicle violations: +\$50 each
- 1 Occupancy Limit Exceeding: \$125 average

# PRE-DEPARTURE COMPLIANCE CHECKLIST

# 30 Days Before Departure

- [] Download offline maps for target areas
- [] Check current fire restrictions by region
- [] Verify LTVA permit requirements and fees
- [] Research local field office contact information

# 7 Days Before Departure

- [] Check weather and seasonal closures
- [] Confirm equipment compliance by state
- [] Download BLM Recreation Permits app
- [] Print backup field office contact sheets

#### **Day of Departure**

- [] GPS tracking app installed and configured
- [] All required equipment loaded and accessible
- [] Emergency contact information updated
- [] Compliance documentation folder organized

# **DOCUMENTATION REQUIREMENTS**

#### **Essential Records to Maintain**

- GPS logs with timestamps
- Photos of campsite on arrival/departure
- Odometer readings and mileage calculations
- Fuel receipts showing movement between areas
- Any ranger interaction documentation

# **Digital Backup Strategy**

- Cloud storage for all GPS data
- Photo timestamps enabled
- Offline map downloads current
- Contact information for legal assistance if needed

# LEGAL CONSIDERATIONS

# **Federal Citation Consequences**

- Appear on federal background checks
- Can affect employment and security clearances
- More serious than local camping violations
- May require court appearances

# **Appeal Process**

- Citations can be contested through federal administrative procedures
- Success rates vary by violation type and evidence quality
- Documentation of good-faith compliance efforts strengthens appeals
- Legal representation recommended for significant penalties
