Company Research & Selection					
Check verified customer reviews on Trustpilot (minimum 1,000+ reviews for reliability)					
Red flags: Companies refusing detailed cost breakdowns, vague mileage policies, or poor customer service ratings					
For peer-to-peer: Filter hosts with 15+ reviews, 4.8+ rating, response time under 2 hours					
For first-time renters: Prioritize traditional companies (Cruise America) over peer-to-peer for predictability					
■ Booking Phase (6–10 weeks before travel)					
Request itemized cost breakdown including ALL fees before booking – companies hiding costs add the most surprises					
Verify insurance coverage: What's included vs. what costs extra vs. what your auto insurance covers					
Read cancellation policies carefully – peer-to-peer platforms have more restrictive terms					
Book 90–120 days in advance for peak season (June–August) to avoid 300–400% price increases					
Consider cancellation protection insurance if booking early or during peak season					
Money-saving tip: Look for one-way relocation deals from traditional companies (can save 30–50%)					
Route I	Planning Phase (4–6 v	weeks before	travel)		
Use RV-specific GPS/routing: Standard directions don't account for height, weight, or bridge restrictions					
Add 25–30% to standard driving distances for RV-appropriate routes					
Research campground availability and book RV-suitable sites in advance					
Plan fuel stops: Large RVs need truck stops, not regular gas stations					

Identify 24/7 roadside assistance contact numbers for your rental company/platform

■ Insurance & Legal Phase (2–4 weeks before travel)
Verify your auto insurance RV coverage: Most policies exclude vehicles over 10,000 lbs (Class A & many Class C RVs)
Understand liability limits: Rental insurance typically covers \$1M+ but confirm coverage gaps
Review damage dispute processes: Traditional companies vs. peer-to-peer platform mediation
Confirm driver requirements: Some RVs require special licenses or age restrictions
Critical: Personal property inside RV typically NOT covered – pack accordingly
■ Pre-Departure Phase (1 week before travel)
Document ALL existing damage with photos/video before departure – this prevents false damage claims
Get complete walkthrough of all systems: electrical, plumbing, generator, slide-outs
Test generator, A/C, heating, and all appliances before leaving the lot
Confirm generator usage policies and hourly rates (typically \$3-7/hour)
Review weight limits and loading restrictions for the specific RV class
Get emergency contact numbers and understand after-hours procedures
■■ Critical Mistakes to Avoid
Top 5 Costly Mistakes (Based on Customer Complaints)
 Assuming auto insurance covers RV rentals → Can cost \$10,000+ in uncovered damage Underestimating mileage by 25–40% → Overage fees of \$400–800+ common Booking peak season within 60 days → Limited options at 300–400% premium rates Skipping thorough damage documentation → False damage claims averaging \$500–2,000 Ignoring generator limitations → Dead batteries, system failures, repair charges
Peer-to-Peer Platform Warning Signs Host with fewer than 10 reviews or rating below 4.7 Response time over 4 hours to booking inquiries Professional photos but negative reviews about actual condition Vague answers about vehicle maintenance or damage history Pressure to book immediately or claims of "last available"
 Success Indicators Transparent upfront pricing with all fees clearly itemized Quick, detailed responses to pre-booking questions Recent positive reviews mentioning vehicle condition and cleanliness Clear damage/dispute policies explained before booking
